<u>Public Charge Proposed Rule Change</u>: public comment ended on Dec 10. There was a great turnout with the comments, the administration is going through the comments. If and when a rule is published, it would take at least 60 days into place. It is NOT retroactive, if people have received benefits before it went into effect they would not be affected. Because of the shutdown, it may take longer for staff to respond to all the comments, which is a good thing.

<u>Farm Bill</u>: For SNAP, this bill protects eligibility and benefits. It keeps broad-based eligibility intact, as well as the connection between SNAP, LIHEAP, free school meals. The bill extends training programs. SNAP ED maintained its structure. The Farm Bill increased funding for TFAP. CSFP (commodity programs) changes made it easier to recertify eligible individuals. Community Food Projects grant was re-authorized, but the funding was reduced slightly. The new farm to food bank program, FINIY, has now been made permanent, this program supports double up food bucks. The House wanted to add strict work requirements, but these were taken out of the final version of the bill.

<u>FDA proposed changes:</u> 75,000 people could be affected. The changes would affect states' ability to ask for a waiver in the future. Public comment period will be opened in the near future. When the comment period is open, information will be shared.

<u>Government Shutdown</u>: there has been a lot of rumors that SNAP benefits were not being loaded onto cards. This is not true, benefits are being loaded, stores are able to accept SNAP/EBT, and applications are being accepted.

- USDA's February plan: They are piggybacking on the continued resolution that expired Dec 20. The February benefits will need to be applied for by Jan 20 and should be secured. Benefits will be guaranteed through February, but after they are unsure.
- TFAP and Commodity programs January, February, and March deliveries are still scheduled.
- WIC has been working to get Feb benefits in place, they should be available

#### Discussion

10 cents a meal has not had a lot of utilization in Kent County. Denise will be coming in sometime in the next few months, to talk about how we can engage with the schools. If you have connections with school districts or are interested, keep an eye on the agenda, or connect with Wende. If you have relationships with food or procurement departments, start having the conversations now if able. 10 cents a meal provides 10 cents reimbursements for every meal that they serve that has locally sourced ingredients. It is not a huge chunk of money for the schools but helps them set up systems so they are able to source locally. There is money in the funding to help track the data across prosperity regions (basically how the state is divided into economic development regions).
